Amongst other things, February brings with it St Valentine's Day. This is a day when we *should* reflect on love and on what love is, giving thanks for the human love that we receive from, and share with, the one closest to us. Cards, of varying degrees of tastefulness, help us to convey the love that we feel!

But, what is love? I think the world has become increasingly befuddled by love. We confuse it with liking or enjoying something very much. And, let's be honest, we confuse it with sex and even lust. Love, though, is something deeper, greater and more wonderful than all of those things.

For Christians, it is impossible to think about love without thinking about God – the author and creator of love. In particular, we think about God's love revealed in Jesus Christ. To know what *real* love is like, we look to the cross where Christ was crucified and there we discover the characteristics of genuine love. This love is, first and foremost, enduring – it lasts through good times and bad. It is forgiving. It is selfless. St Paul describes real love like this,

"Love never gives up. Love cares more for others than for self. Love doesn't want what it doesn't have. Love doesn't strut, doesn't have a swelled head, doesn't force itself on others, isn't always "me first', doesn't fly off the handle, doesn't keep score of the sins of others, doesn't revel when others grovel, takes pleasure in the flowering of truth, puts up with anything, trusts God always, always looks for the best, never looks back, but keeps going to the end. Love never dies." 1 Corinthians 13: 4-8 (The Message)

This is what God's love for us looks like and somehow, in the brokenness of our humanity, this is the sort of love that we should try to emulate in *all* of our relationships. It's not easy and it requires constant work and dedication – I speak from experience!

Because of where Easter falls this year, St Valentine's Day is also the beginning of the season of Lent – Ash Wednesday. This is a time when Christians prepare themselves for the great celebration of Easter and the eternal hope that comes with Christ's resurrection life and light. Before Easter, of course, comes the pain and desolation of Good Friday and Christ's oncefor-all death on the cross. We'll think more about that next month.

For now, though, I'd like to encourage us – and I very much include myself in this – during Lent, not just to 'give something up' but, instead, to think about love and about how in our dealings with others we can live out that Godly love that St Paul was writing about.

Imagine what our lives, our relationships, our communities and our world would be like if we all committed ourselves to that...

The Rev Dr Anthony Harvey

May 1st 1930 – January 9th 2018

Alison, my father's neighbour rang me on 8th January to tell me the sad news that my father had had a severe stroke and that she and Brian, Sue Burdett and Mr and Mrs Kelly were looking after him. This immediately brought home to me and my sisters the amazing sense of love, friendship, caring and community that exists in Willersey where so many people have helped and looked out for my father with such kindness.

When my mother had Alzheimer's so many people very kindly helped my father look after her or, if she got lost walking around the village, would bring her back home. My father would talk so enthusiastically to us about the many people he loved and admired in the village. He was deeply committed to both the Church and the Willersey community.

He did all he could to support the local shop as he knew the crucial role that it played in supporting the community spirit and the independence of those without a car and believed that if it were lost this would seriously harm the village. He loved going down to the shop first thing in the morning with his basket and saying good morning to those he met.

My father was a New Testament scholar/lecturer at Oxford University, and throughout his life wrote many books on theology; the best known of these was a large commentary on the whole of the New Testament "A Companion to the New Testament" which later earned him his doctorate. He wrote under the name A.E Harvey. He was Canon/Sub-dean of Westminster Abbey from 1982 to 1999.

Knitting, crochet, sewing, etc. all going on, to make goods which are badly needed by those who have nothing!

13th February is Shrove Tuesday! Pancakes will be available at our church on that day run by the United Churches and all profits will go to Christian Aid.

Unfortunately we are unable to run Lent Lunches this year. After discussions between both Churches we realise we cannot provide the workforce. Instead see below.

Lent starts 14th February with Ash Wednesday Service, Aston Sub-Edge, 7.30 pm. For the rest of the weeks of Lent the Methodist Church will be open from 9 – 12 on a Friday to enable people who might like to come and sit quietly in church, and there will be a prayer board for you to leave personal prayers. (Paper and pen will be provided) So you could spend the whole of Friday mornings with us and browse the leaflets as above, think quietly, enjoy coffee and we're going to get some books together so that you can sit and read or borrow one for a week or so; also, of course, craft as above. St Peter's will hold their Wednesday Service as usual and the church will be open every day - there is a prayer board there too.

He was always passionately concerned about community, asylum seekers, refugees, all those who are marginalised, and justice. He was the theologian on the Church's influential report into inner-city poverty in the mid 80s called "Faith in the City".

In 1998 he was instrumental in the installation of ten statues of modern martyrs (including Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Martin Luther King and Oscar Romero) above the West Door of Westminster Abbey. Recently the issues close to his heart were justice for the memory of Bishop George Bell, ACES the society for children in El Salvador and above all Willersey; the village, the church and his vicar.

The prayers of those in the village, and our vicar the Rev. Scott Watts taking morning prayer with him (so sensitively) helped to make his death at the end so beautiful and peaceful. Hospitality was just one of our father's many gifts, and as he breathed his last there was not only a great sense of Confirmation that his work on earth was done, but a vividness that he has gone on ahead of us to that "house of many mansions" to help prepare a place for us all.

Anthony Harvey's funeral will take place at 2 p.m. on Wednesday 7th February at St Peter's Church Willersey. Everyone is welcome to come to refreshments in the Village Hall afterwards.

In the autumn of 2016 the Hall Management Committee commissioned a structural survey to be carried out on the hall prior to planning a number of hall improvements. The survey highlighted that we had some major problems with the hall, including problems with the steel cladding on the roof with facias and guttering that also need replacing. The survey also highlighted problems with the external cedar wood cladding, the large main hall windows plus a number of other problems. In view of this much needed remedial work the hall committee has since carried out our full review of what work needs to be done and what work we would like to do to ensure the hall continues to be a thriving community centre for village activities.

The Hall committee has successfully applied for planning permission to knock down the old wooden sheds at the back of the hall and build a more permanent storage room. This room will house tables, chairs and a new stackable staging system which will replace the existing stage which will be removed, this will give the hall a more flexible arrangement with the option of different size stages for any occasion.

The roof needs to be completely stripped off and new insulation, boarding and roof cladding fitted together with new fascia and guttering, we also plan to replace the large main hall windows and re-clad the outside of the Hall with a more modern style alternative. We also need to make our entrances more wheelchair friendly, with better ramps and handrails this will be enhanced by relaying the patio area with new paving and walling.


As you can see this is a very ambitious project for our Hall Committee to take on and subject to us obtaining sufficient grant funding we plan to carry out this work in 2019. We already have the promise of a large sum of money towards this project by way of the governments S106 developers contribution scheme but we still need to make grant applications to make up the shortfall. Our next step is to get an accurate cost of the refurbishment work and to make the all important grant applications, once we have this information we propose to hold a Presentation Evening in the Hall to get every ones approval and hopefully your support in making this project a reality.

In the meantime we have a couple of changes to our hall committee which sees Bill and Annie Payne taking over as our lettings secretaries (858368) and Lucy Jordan taking over as Treasurer (854886)

Proposed New Houses and Bungalows at Willersey

Newland Homes are pleased to be providing information for residents following our Outline Planning Application being submitted. The site, as shown below, is located to the north of our existing development site accessed off Collin Lane, through the existing development site. The site is well located for access to the village and local services.



Area shown in grey above shows extent of proposed development The site covers an area of approximately 1.8 hectares. Our indicative layout has been landscape led for up to 40 dwellings, this will provide a mix of detached and terraced houses and includes 16 bungalows. The design of the homes will be influenced by the character of Willersey and the houses within the conservation area.

Highway Safety

As part of the approval for the existing development, new highway works and traffic calming measures have been agreed. This will be a new footpath and crossing point which will provide a pedestrian link to the existing footpath to the east of Collin Close, providing a safe link to Main Street. Collin Lane will also be narrowed in 2 places to the east of the site, this will reduce traffic speeds along Collin Lane.

BELL RINGING AND BEER



Now let's be clear from the off that there is no compulsion to consume beer to be a bell ringer. Although a little modest refreshment for some of the ringers after a Thursday practice night is not uncommon.

However, now I have got your attention, you might be interested to know that in the early years of bell ringing it was something of a macho sport for young men who would imbibe quite heavily **before** ringing and then 'topple' into the church service. If you look carefully at lots of churches - including St Peter's -you can see where the entrance from the ringing chamber into the church has been bricked up to keep the rowdy ringers out of the service. Nowadays ringers are far more well behaved.

Before the turn of the 18th century St Peter's had only three bells, but in 1712 three more were added to give the six that we have today. The smallest bell weighs 4cwt, with the tenor being the largest bell at just over 11cwt - the approximate weight of an original mini.

But ringing does not require huge strength - it's about controlling the bell you are ringing with technique. Being able to count is all the maths needed and you can become a very good ringer knowing nothing about music. A few weeks of tuition enables new ringers to join in with the band on a Sunday morning and become part of a three hundred year old village tradition.

Pete Kavanagh, Beccie Williams - our latest ringing recruit, or Bob Topp would be happy to chat further - with or without a beer.

The wren, that tiny russet bird with a stubby tail and pulsating song, is our second smallest bird weighing in at just 10 grams; and perhaps somewhat surprisingly, also the most common breeding bird in the UK.

There was a time when a Boxing Day tradition would see gangs of boys in fancy dress and masks involved in the gruesome practice of hunting and killing this tiny bird. It's not as if life in the winter wasn't hard enough for the tiny wren, with them needing to huddle together for warmth to survive really cold nights. One nest box used as a roost recorded 63 wrens snuggled up together. In really cold winters we can see wren numbers plummet, but recovering quickly in milder years.

Spring time sees male wrens building several nests and then encouraging the female to choose one to which she then adds the nest lining. Quite often males set up home with more than one female in the nests they build; with the male not helping to raise the chicks in either nest. Given that as many as 8 or 9 chicks may fledge successfully in just one nest this is some single parent operation.
