PASTORAL LETTER – June 2024

Gardens

This month we are opening the Vicarage garden (15th and 16th) as part of a fund raising weekend for Campden Home Nursing. It always comes with a bit of stress, and we rush to make it look presentable not that we are in any way an exemplar of horticultural good practice or garden design. It's a good stimulus to do some wedding, pruning and general care.

The garden is a curiosity given its location. We are also a curiosity because we do not garden intensively rather, we manage the wild. It's a privilege of having space so that we can leave bits untended. We intentionally leave nettles and deadwood. We've added a large compost heap, a hedgehog house, various bird boxes and bug hotels. The garden is managed in the hope that we can increase the biodiversity of both the flora and fauna.

We have planted more than 15 fruit trees. A variety of species which not only offer fantastic blossom but provide a variety of fruits. We planted a mulberry and a medlar the kind of oddity that Vicarage gardens ought to contain.

We dug out an old pond some years ago. In the first year we thought the pond plants had all died but now they are doing well. We occasionally get blooms of pond weed that seems to choke everything else but despite these hic-ups the pond life thrives; newts have returned.

The vegetable patch suffers from lack of care. Its always painful to return after the summer holiday and see its neglected state so this year we're using part of it as a plant hospital and place to grow low maintenance flowers.

For some years I have been letting the grass grow throughout the summer. Cutting in the late summer and early autumn and then at the end of winter before the spring surge of growth. We have been rewarded by three types of native orchid appearing. ast year we planted a mix of meadow seed on the site of our old chicken coop. Dense foliage has sprung up and we are looking forward to seeing what flowers burst into bloom later in the season.

We do this as an expression of our faith. The first commandment in scripture is to tend and care for the earth (Genesis 2: 15).

A teenager held a party in their parents' home. The party got out of hand and caused thousands of pounds of damage to the family home that had been lovingly created by the parents. What does God think of our treatment of the natural world? Does humanity sometimes act thoughtlessly, putting themselves and their personal enjoyment above the care of the home they were given?

Recent Village Sightings

They're back: the first swifts were spotted over Main Street on the 7th May, exactly the same date as last year, and hopefully by now egg laying will be well underway. House martins have arrived and occupying the seemingly last nest site in the village. Village swallows also seem to be in short supply, although Gorsehill Abbey Farm has returning swallows which you can check out as you buy their delicious milk. Other milk suppliers are available! But a report of a pair of barn owls quartering a nearby field and an early morning calling male cuckoo really is pleasing news to share.

Plenty of nest box action is being observed with blue tits and great tits busy feeding nestlings, and house sparrows also occupying a terrace box. Of course, not all nest boxes will be used every year, and not all eggs hatch and not all nestlings survive to fledge, but that's all part of nature's story. There are plenty of newly fledged blackbird youngsters, wrens and young robins too, minus that red breast at this early stage. One theory being that without their red breast they are less likely to be harassed by mature robins that are very territorial. Recently fledged noisy wing fluttering starlings are now being seen begging parents for an easy meal.

It is delightful to hear of another brown hare, and

snuffling hedgehogs going about their noisy courtship being recorded from a variety of gardens across the village. A shared picture of an eyed hawk moth with a 5cm wingspan and bat sightings illustrating what else is on the move. It's amazing what goes on after dark! And as the weather warms, we are starting to hear about other butterflies joining orange tip, holly blue and brimstone that were some of the earliest on the wing in spring. Large and small whites, and further hatches of tortoiseshell and peacocks will soon be decorating our gardens.

A small group of us met at *Number 8* in Pershore to view paintings and artwork created by local artists, and to enjoy refreshments. From the theatre coffee shop we made our way to Pershore Abbey for a guided tour. We learnt a lot of interesting facts regarding its history.

In medieval times the Abbey was much larger. There is a link with Westminster Abbey with the choir being entitled to wear the same red colour robes as Westminster. A basket of plums is paid as a peppercorn rent to Westminster Abbey annually.

As an embroidery group we were particularly interested in the design on the altar cloth and the beautifully worked kneelers in grey and red threads.

Outside we observed the platform constructed high up for the peregrine falcons to perch. They have successfully hatched eggs again this year and with cameras set up, viewing progress of the birds is possible.

The head of girls' PE was seriously cross. However, all other attempts to free the hedgehog from the hockey net had failed. My use of the scissors really had been a last resort.

On another occasion my attention was drawn to two male hedgehogs vying over a female in the back garden. Their ensuing scuffle then enabled another male to appear on the scene to try his luck. Hedgehog courtship is truly a noisy affair and can last for hours.

Such close encounters have made these little 'guys' a particular favourite, but they continue to be in serious trouble.

If we want to help stem this decline allowing movement between gardens, putting out water and suitable food such specially prepared hedgehog food or calciworms - not meal worms as these cause brittle bones - and trying to leave an undisturbed corner of the garden with old dead wood and leaf litter can really help. Having said all of that hedgehogs when introduced to a new environment can have unintended consequences. They were introduced by European colonists to New Zealand to help them feel more at home, but they have gone on to cause great loss of native fauna. It's a similar story in the Scottish Isle of Uist where introduced hedgehogs have been responsible for a dramatic impact on ground nesting birds. So New Zealand and Uist are just two places where

ill-considered introduction of hedgehogs has resulted in the need for expensive schemes to control or totally remove our charming friend to protect other wildlife.

Nature is complicated. But here, right now, hedgehogs need a helping hand if generations to come are to enjoy their snuffling presence in the countryside and our gardens.
