PASTORAL LETTER – July 2024

Limbo and limbering

I am remarkably unsupple. Games of limbo have always been avoided. My years of walking I suspect haven't helped; rather than flexibility I have developed a stable frame that minimises wobbles. Last year I picked up an injury and some additional stretching may aid my recovery. My morning routine now includes some rather undignified huffing and puffing as I work through a series of exercises. Progress is at best slow. Daily physical exercise is a good thing and I know I am not alone. Like me lots of people include physical activity into their daily regimes and some people, athletes; and sports men and women train, strength and condition their bodies over many years to maximise performance. This summer and this month we have an enticing array of top-class sporting competition on offer. The football EUROs are on-going as is the Tour de France, Wimbledon is about to start, the Golf Open and the Olympics are later in the month ... It will take real dedication to keep on top of it all but I will do what I can from the comfort of the Vicarage sofa. Many people put effort into maintaining their physical health be that though walking or more vigorous exercise, yoga or Pilates. it begs the question what things are we doing to maintain or enhance our mental, emotional, and spiritual health? It will be no surprise to hear that walking helps me in all these regards, but I know that doesn't suit everyone. When I was at theological college a tutor offered a course which sought to make us more generous - it was a fascinating progress we began by counting our blessings and recognising how much we had to be thankful for. There were then a series of activities aimed at helping us think about generosity from different perspectives. One I particularly remember was the challenge to give away all the clothes we hadn't worn in the previous 12 or 24 months.

I know how to get more flexible – I stretch. I know how to get

fitter – exercise a little more. We know about physical health but what about our spiritual health. Could we devise a series of exercises to become more prayerful, or more joyful, more compassionate, exhibit better self-control, or find deeper peace? If we want these things, how can we grow them in our daily lives?

St Paul in his letter to the church in Philippi uses the metaphor of an athlete in competition (3: 13b-14) says, "One thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus." Of course, following Jesus isn't competitive and it is open to everyone, not just the elite. Through Jesus we are offered God's love and forgiveness not because of anything we've done but because of his death and resurrection.

Paul is encouraging us to have the same passion and desire to know Christ that a top athlete, an Olympian has for their sport. "For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ." (3: 8b) Everything else that might occupy us is rubbish (a sanitised translation), it is a distraction from the main goal, the ultimate purpose of life which is knowing Christ in all his fullness.

This month may you enjoy sporting excellence and achievement, may you be gentle with yourself and others, may you grow in the likeness of Christ.

Willersey Telegraph Poles update and AONB Judicial Review

You may well remember that many village residents from Willow Road, Field Lane, Jordans Close, Hayes Close and Collin Close united to protest against the installation of 11 metre telegraph poles by Full Fibre Ltd in November and December 2023. The basic issue of the protest was that in roads within Willersey where there were no existing telegraph poles, little or no streetlights, and no other "street furniture" we were being forced, without any consultation, to have a duplicated broadband network installed above ground level when a perfectly functioning underground network existed installed by Gigaclear Ltd several years ago. The answers we received from a number of official bodies and organisations were that the installation is legally allowed as it is "permitted development" under Government legislation.

The Willersey protest gained national media attention and we were successful in that to date only 6 of the planned 15 poles have been installed in Willersey.



A similar "battle" played out in neighbouring Broadway. The residents there have since mounted a determined campaign to challenge their District Council (Wychavon) regarding the process followed in not challenging the installation of 25 telegraph poles by Full Fibre Ltd within the Sands estate. On

7th May'24 the Broadway Residents won a legal Court appeal and are now fully permitted to challenge Wychavon District Council in a Judicial Review which is based on the principle that as the land is within the Cotswold AONB (area of outstanding natural beauty) Wychavon should have demanded that "the visual impact of the development on the site is minimised so far as practicable". If the Judicial Review is successful then it could mean that a formal planning process is required (rather than using the "permitted development" route) and if retrospective permission is not granted then the poles could be removed. So, what does mean for Willersey? If Broadway are successful then the same ruling would also apply to us as the area affected in Willersey is within the Cotswold AONB. This would mean that Cotswold District Council would be forced to go through a formal planning approval process.

Unfortunately, there is a cost to mounting the Judicial Review and the Broadway Team are seeking funds of around £10,000. They already, in less than 3 weeks, have amassed a sum of £1,500 and need to raise another £8,500 before the end of September. 52 Ways to Walk by Annabel Streets A book review by Revd Craig bishop

I read non-fiction. I read mostly about nature, the landscape and walking. As genres they aren't huge and I've reasonable coverage of them all. When I pass a bookstore, I visit the nature and travel sections to see what's new. It's surprising just how many books there are on walking: descriptions of journeys, reflections, and meditations of travelling by foot. On a recent visit to a bookshop, I was looking for a few new titles to give me lots of material over a holiday. I had chosen a couple but was still searching for a third when my eye caught the cover of "52 ways to walk". The title didn't enthuse me. I've got a fair idea of how to walk ... but the subtitle "the surprising science of walking for wellness and joy, one week at a time", piqued my curiosity. I bought it and brought it home. It is a delightful book; the short chapters each describing a different type of walking. It mixes anecdote, science and hypothesis. Each walk concludes with a few practical and encouraging tips.

Despite being a seasoned walker I don't find it in anyway condescending or patronising rather I find it a source of motivation and inspiration. The level of scientific detail is enthralling. I am discovering almost by accident I have stumbled upon an excellent way of maintaining health be that physical, mental, emotional or spiritual. Chapters include: a slow walk, a windy walk, walk with your ears, follow a river, sing as you stride, walk barefoot, walk to get lost, walk beneath the moon – each one explores a different facet, a different opportunity, challenge. This is lovely book if you already walk a lot. This is a lovely book if you'd like to walk more.

Recent Village Sightings

Lots of wildlife sightings to celebrate this month with accounts of kestrels, red kites and buzzards seeking out an easy meal as silage is cut; and a stooping peregrine performing right over the village.

More news received of nesting swifts in the village, with non breeders affectionately known as 'bangers' observed briefly touching roofs and checking out possible breeding sites for next year. The house with house martins has two nests; and although properties that traditionally have returning swallows have reported their return this spring it would seem that numbers are down this year. Fingers crossed for a good breeding season, but insects are in short supply, with an authoritative quoted figure of a 78% national loss of insect numbers over the last 20 years. Unblemished car windscreens these days underlines this change.

Other migrants are adding to our local soundscape with fluting blackcaps and chiffchaffs as well as the scratchy sound of whitethroats noted. Green woodpeckers with their 'yaffle' call are quite a commonly reported sound along with hole nesting stock doves with their "Wooa, Wooa" call. Plus great-spotted woodpeckers on fat ball feeders adding interest and colour to a number of gardens. Regular Willersey walkers have reported young fox sightings, and others have spotted that there are now mallard ducklings on the village pond, hopefully keeping a sharp look out for large gulls, herons and swimming grass snakes.

Not all garden visitors are good news, particularly for honey bees, with a possible sighting of an Asian hornet that can decimate honey bee hives. But a cheerier note on which to end is news of successfully fledged wrens, the sight of hunting barn owls with young to feed right here in Willersey; and the sound of skylarks close to the village, with some benefiting from the recently created wild flower meadow on the road towards Badsey. Glorious.

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Nature Box - HAWKING

Hawking is of course a hunting approach commonly used by many creatures for catching prey in the air.

Right now in Willersey we are blessed with migrant arrivals that almost exclusively hunt and feed on the wing. Swallows, swifts and the occasional house martin can all be seen hawking around the village; although swifts are particularly adept at travelling huge distances if food is in short supply locally whilst their nestlings quietly await their next meal. It's quite fascinating to know that whilst swift chicks can cope for up to four days without a meal the young blue tit nestlings won't survive much beyond four hours.

Raptors will capture birds and sometimes bats and other creatures such as dragonflies with their feet; whereas many other birds that hawk for insects will catch them in their beaks.

At particular times large numbers of insects - often flying ants and perhaps surprisingly spiders - rise up into the air to provide an all-you-can-eat buffet for lots of other birds including starlings, corvids and gulls. Spotted flycatchers, although far less common these day, are easily picked out when seen with their flying and returning to the same perch

after catching an insect. Perhaps the most adept hunters of all are dragonflies,

rarely missing a target, that possess exceptional hawking ability: travelling at great speed, hovering and even able to fly backwards, and to be seen in our gardens and over the village pond in mid summer. But darkness doesn't bring any respite for some flying insects with pipistrelle bats in particular to be seen hawking and hoovering up moths and other insects as daylight fades. *Bob Topp*
